# **Facts & Advice about County Lines**

**County Lines** is a term used to describe gangs and organised criminal networks involved in **exporting illegal drugs** into one or more importing areas within the UK, using dedicated mobile phone lines or other form of 'deal line'.

They are likely to exploit children and vulnerable adults to move and store the drugs and money, and they will often use coercion, intimidation, violence (including sexual violence) and weapons.

### Where is this happening?


Whilst London, Merseyside and the West Midlands continue to be the dominant urban source of county lines offending, local lines have quickly mirrored the business model.


This is not just a big city problem with smaller towns also being targeted. The student community can also be vulnerable to County Lines. With the constantly changing student population, drug dealers can go unnoticed and move about freely and may even use student accommodation. Many students are away from home for the first time, have financial issues and are unaware of the environment and individuals who surround them.

### What's 'Cuckooing'? (Named after the cuckoo bird who takes over the nest of another)

Drug dealers will take over the home/accommodation of an individual, usually vulnerable, for a short period of time, and use it as a base for drug dealing. Some signs of possible cuckooing are:

- An increase in people entering and leaving
- An increase in cars, bikes and taxi's outside
- Possible increase in anti-social behaviour
- Increasing litter/take away's, which is far more than would be for one individual
- Signs of drugs use
- Suspicious vehicles or people at an address
- Occupier leaving and returning to the address of numerous occasions for short periods





This crime is often associated with other serious crimes such as sexual exploitation, violence, money laundering and human trafficking. Watch this short video which explains what a County Line is -


